

Who Would'a Thought? Birth of A Pet Bereavement Group!

My Mother grew up in Hungary during World War I. Food was scarce and had to be guarded and protected. Dogs and cats were considered to be food stealers, therefore my Mother's attitude toward pets was quite negative. At the age of 16 she came to the United States, specifically to Brooklyn, NY. Within a few years she married the man who was to be my father and they created a family. First, I came along followed by a brother 2 years later. Both my brother and I wanted a dog or a cat. As expected, this did not go over well with my Mother. She did compromise by allowing us to have fish, birds, turtles and small lizards. Our next-door neighbor bred the most adorable cocker spaniel puppies, and the neighbor one house down from him rescued any cat who would seem to be homeless. I was so jealous! No pleading would work.

Several years went by, I married, we had three daughters, and we did get a cat. But our daughters wanted a dog! My husband was afraid of dogs, so adopting one was not on his agenda. The children persisted. When our middle daughter turned 6 years old, she was swimming in our local pool and stepped on a sharp stone requiring several stitches and received doctor's orders not to swim for the rest of the summer. She was devastated as she loved the water. To placate her, my husband promised that we would get a dog. There was no turning back now! The puppy lived with us until she passed away at the age of fifteen.

During this time I went to social work school and became a clinical social worker. The jobs I held centered around the areas of trauma and addiction. Both areas deal with grief and loss. Dogs and cats were always a strong part of my life. After 25 years I retired and got bored. A close friend of mine was on the Board of an organization called PAL (People Animals Love), who needed a mental health trained volunteer to talk on the telephone to folks whose pets had died or were in the process of dying. I did that for 2 years when a member of PAL had a dog she loved die. She promised her dog that she would create a bereavement group for animal loss. Guess who was asked to be the mental health leader of the group! You're right!

It's been a long road from World War I to 2020. I am engaged in getting this group up and running. We hold our meetings on the second Sat-

Enhancements to Leisure World Trust Properties

Have you ever wondered how an individual or committee with an idea for an enhancement to the LW community might begin to make it a reality? To make the process of proposing projects manageable, the Community Planning Advisory Committee (CPAC) is developing guidelines for proposals and will soon issue a call for new proiects so that all ideas can be considered at once the same decision criteria. CPAC is responsible for reviewing and recommending projects funded from the resales fund to be considered by the LW Board. This is similar to the process from 2015-2019 that identified the need for significant upgrades to the restaurants, Crystal Ballroom, and meeting rooms in Club House I and the Fitness Center and Ping Pong room in Club House II. Two other projects on that original list, the new Administration Building and the Golf Course, are underway. Watch for an announcement in the LW News and attend the relevant Advisory Committee to share your ideas. CPAC is committed to ensuring that Leisure World Trust properties are continuously upgraded and enhanced to serve changing needs of the community.
